

TYPE CLASSIFICATION

Type is divided into general families by the design of the typeface. There are various methods of such classification. One of the more common is the following:

ROMAN: The oldest common style and probably the most legible. Has serifs and variation in letter stroke. Most legible and is considered reliable, credible, traditional. Roman typefaces can be subdivided into oldstyle, transitional, and modern. One of the most common modern roman typefaces is **Times**:

SANS SERIF (GOTHIC): A modern typeface design without serifs and with uniform letter strokes. Considered clean, neat and modern. May be nearly as legible as roman. Some criticize sans serif typefaces as "sterile". A popular sans serif typeface is **Ariel**.

Generally speaking, most corporate/organization type style is restricted to these two families. Commonly, one is selected for text type and the other for headlines and contrast such as captions and subheads. One of the keys to effective type style is the matching of compatible and complimentary type faces. Times and Helvetica (Ariel) are considered by many to work well together; as are Palatino and Avant Garde. Sometimes a square serif face is used for contrast rather than a sans serif face.



SQUARE SERIF: Square serifs with uniform letter strokes. Not as widely used and probably not as legible for lengthy text as sans serif faces. Clean and neat with some strength. Frequently used for contrast or a different look. The most common square serif face is Lubalin. This is Rockwell

Another popular square serif face is Memphis.

SCRIPTS AND CURSIVES: Faces which look like calligraphy or handwriting. Connote both formality and informality. Very poor legibility. Note: usually you have to use scripts in larger point sizes than other typefaces. Palace Script is a common script face.

DECORATIVE, NOVELTY, OR SPECIAL: These are uniquely designed typefaces which do not fall into other common classifications. Usually have very low legibility. Generally used for headlines or other special effects. An example of a novelty typeface is **BAUHAUS**:
